"Standing Knee Deep in a River (Dying of Thirst)" is a classic Kathy Mattea song, first made popular in 1992 and still often replayed on YouTube.

It is a moving song of a person thinking back over all the friends with whom she had lost touch, the sweethearts who had gone separate ways, and other lonely people she passed each day, who could be friends if she just reached out to them.

Most Americans are standing parched, knee deep in a river of blessings, but they seem to be dying of the thirst of discontent. The English word *content* means "desiring no more than what one has" The Greek word (arkeo) means "to be satisfied." Thus one who is content is satisfied with what he has and has no desire for more. How many people do you know like that? What, then, are the springs from which the river of contentment flows?

SPRING 1: CONTENTMENT COMES THROUGH THE FEAR OF GOD

Solomon wrote, "The fear of the Lord leads to life, and he who has it will abide in satisfaction; he will not be visited with evil" (Proverbs 19:23).

Multi-millionaire William Randolph Hearst invested a fortune in collecting art treasures from around the world. One day Hearst read a description of a valuable art item and then sent his agent abroad to find it. After months of searching, the agent reported that he had finally found the treasure. To the surprise of Hearst, the priceless masterpiece was stored in none other than his own warehouse! This wealthy man had been searching all over the world for a treasure he already possessed. Had he read the catalog of his treasures, he would have saved himself a lot of time and money. As believers we may be like that. We look for contentment in the world, though we will never find it there. Yet Christ has already given it to us. The fear of God leads us to seek out God's way, which in turn helps us find contentment.

SPRING 2: CONTENTMENT COMES THROUGH STRONG DESIRE FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS

Jesus said, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled" (Matthew 5:6). Athletes are said to be hungry when they have a strong competitive spirit. An aspiring businessman is said to be hungry when he is willing to work extra hard and do whatever it takes to be successful. Some are hungry for prestige, riches, honor, fame, or political office. These are not the things for which we should hunger (Colossians 3:2). God wants us to be hungry for righteousness (1 Peter 2:2; Hebrews 5:12-14). In so doing, He makes a promise to "fill" us. The word means to be satisfied with food; originally, it described feeding animals with hay. What is a better picture of contentment than a cow having eaten to the full and then standing in the shade chewing her cud?

SPRING 3: CONTENTMENT COMES THROUGH TRUST IN GOD'S PRESENCE

Only God has the ability to provide lasting satisfaction (Psalm 107:8-9). He promises to give that which truly satisfies: "the sure mercies of David" (i.e., the blessings promised through the coming Messiah) (Isaiah 55:1-3). David came to see himself as a sheep in God's pasture, and there he found deep contentment. He wrote, "He makes me to lie down in green pastures" (Psalm 23:2). What was it that Paul had in mind when he made the famous statement, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me"? (Philippians 4:13). He was facing the challenge of contentment (4:11-12). For someone as ambitious as Paul, it doubtless was difficult for him to cool his heels in prison without frustration bubbling over. The sentence "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" is actually saying, "I can do all things; I really can!"

SPRING 4: CONTENTMENT COMES THROUGH TRUST IN GOD'S PROMISES

Paul's contentment sprang from his confidence in "even as." He told a pagan ship crew, "Therefore take heart, men, for I believe God that it will be just as it was told me" (Acts 27:25). He told the young preacher, "For I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that He is able to keep what I have committed to Him until that Day" (2 Timothy 1:12).

The knowledge that God always keeps His promises will grant us peace in the midst of any difficulty.

• When we are persecuted, we can trust this promise: "And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand. My Father, who has given them hand" (John 10:28-29).

- surpasses all understanding" (Philippians 4:7).
- When tempted, we can trust this promise: "For in that He Himself has suffered, being tempted, He is able to aid those who are tempted" (Hebrews 2:18).
- When we are facing sickness, disease, injury, and aging, we can trust Him to "transform our lowly body that it may be conformed to His glorious body, according to the working by which He is able even to subdue all things to Himself" (Philippians 3:21).
- When we fear that we may be lost, we can pillow our heads upon this wonderful truth: "Therefore He is also able to save to the uttermost those who come to God through Him, since He always lives to make intercession for them" (Hebrews 7:25).

SPRING 5: CONTENTMENT COMES THROUGH A RELATIONSHIP WITH CHRIST

Jesus is the water of life (John 7:37) who offers an overflowing life to His followers (John 10:10). He promises to "give of the fountain of the water of life freely to him who thirsts" (Revelation 21:6). To start this relationship with Christ, one must pick up a Bible and begin to study



Are You Down in the Pit(s)?

"So it came to pass, when Joseph had come to his brothers, that they stripped Joseph of his tunic, the tunic of many colors that was on him. Then they took him and cast him into a pit. And the pit was empty; there was not water in it" (Genesis 37:23–24).

Have you ever felt like Joseph must have felt on this occasion? Have you felt forsaken by those who loved you or had something precious to you taken away (like his freedom and his coat)? Their original thought was to kill him, but eventually they chose to sell him to Ishmaelite traders. They thought they were through with Joseph, but God intervened.

Trials in life make us bitter or better. Problems can either be opportunities to strive to do the right thing, or they can be obstacles that cause us to shrink back and not do what we can to fix the problem.

A friend once called me with a personal problem. His words were, "I am about at the end of my rope; I do not know where to turn." He was down in the pits, but instead of withdrawing and giving up, he asked for help. He surrounded himself with resources (his friends) who could give him counsel and insight into how he could get out of the pit. Today he is much

better because he allowed the bumps in his road to lift him up to a higher plane of living.

Joseph no longer had his family, but he had the greatest friend a man ever had his God (Romans 8:31). His days of despair were not over. Once more, he was in a pit—this time a prison—because he maintained his integrity and his accountability to God. "How then can I do this great wickedness, and sin against God?" (Genesis 39:9). Even in prison, God was watching over him and blessed him (Genesis 39:21-23). In the end, God made Joseph the second in command of the pagan nation of Egypt. Joseph was reunited with his people, and ultimately (providentially) his family became the nation of Israel that inherited the promised land.

God has promised us that He will not forsake us (Hebrews 13:5–6). Even when we must travel through the valley of death, He has promised to stay with us (Psalm 23:4). May we look for the help He makes available to us, and may we strive to use the problems of life as steppingstones to greater service and as opportunities to grow and to become better, stronger children of God. —Don Williams

Must We Make Confession?

Jesus declared, "Whoever confesses Me before men, him I will also confess before My Father who is in heaven (Matthew 10:32). In the biblical sense, to confess Christ means to profess faith in Him and acknowledge His authority.

Jesus once asked the disciples who men said He was. They explained that some thought Him to be John the Baptist, Elijah, Jeremiah, or another prophet risen from the dead. Jesus said, "But who do you say that I am? Simon Peter answered and said, 'You are the Christ, the Son of the living God'" (Matthew 16:15–16). By his response, Peter confessed Christ.

Paul wrote, "If you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:9–10). "Confession is made unto salvation"; so it should not be minimized. Paul connected heartfelt belief with open confession by the mouth.

Confession of Christ is not, however, merely repeating a formula. It is the outward expression of faith felt in the heart. By confession, we express our acceptance of His authority in every area of our lives, and we give our personal pledge of allegiance to Him and His cause.

The Ethiopian treasurer of Queen Candace did not understand Isaiah's prophetic portrait of Christ, so Philip, "beginning at this Scripture, preached Jesus to him"

(Acts 8:35). As they went on their way, they came to "some water. And the eunuch said, 'See, here is water. What hinders me from being baptized?' Then Philip said, 'If you believe with all your heart, you may.' And he answered and said, 'I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God'" (8:36–37). Based on that confession, Philip baptized him into Christ (8:38).

Because of His sacrifice for us, the Father has exalted Christ "that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow . . . that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10–11). It is said, "The confession is the birthplace of the unselfish element in religion." Have you unreservedly, unselfishly confessed Christ? —Bob Prichard

Many men have tried to destroy the Bible. In A.D. 303, the Roman Emperor Diocletian issued an edict to destroy Christians and their Bibles. Over a burned Bible, he built a monument on which he wrote these words, Extincto momene Christianorum (meaning "the name Christian is extinguished"). Twenty years later, Diocletian was dead, and the new Emperor Constantine commissioned fifty copies of the Bible to be prepared at government expense.

In 1776, the French philosopher Voltaire said, "One hundred years from my day, there will not be a Bible in the earth except one that is looked upon by some antique seeker." One hundred years from the day of Voltaire's prediction, the first edition of his works sold for eleven cents in Paris, but the British government paid Russia half a million dollars for an ancient Bible manuscript.

What Are the Chances?

There are more than three hundred prophecies from the Old Testament fulfilled in the life of Jesus of Nazareth. The prophecies were made centuries before He was born and contain startling details (e.g., the name of the city of His birth, how He would die). In the book Science Speaks, Peter Stoner wrote of the improbability that only eight of these prophecies could be fulfilled accidentally in the life of Jesus. The odds here are 1 in 10 to the 17th power, or 100,000,000,000,000,000 to 1. Stoner illustrates this impossible number by suggesting that if one covers the state of Texas with that many silver dollars, the entire state would be covered in coins two feet deep. If you mark one of the coins, mix the coins thoroughly, and then blindfold a man and tell him to pick up the marked coin on the first try, that would be the same probability of just eight of the messianic prophecies coming true by coincidence.

Judgment Day EXCUSES That Won't Work

We can imagine that on "the judgment of the great day" (Jude 1:6), there will be many excuses. Let's consider some.

"But, Lord, what about all of the good that I have done?" This sounds like Matthew 7:22: "Many will say to Me in that day, 'Lord, Lord, have we not . . . done many wonders in Your name?'" But what will Jesus say? "I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness!" (7:23). What was their shortcoming? They failed to do the Father's will (7:21). The Lord wants us to be "zealous for good works" (Titus 2:14), but all the good works in the world cannot cover sin.

"But, Lord, I was just doing what other folks were doing." Christ taught that this course of action leads to destruction: "Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it" (Matthew 7:13). Remember, something is not right in God's sight just because a lot of people are doing it.

"But, Lord, I was always so busy with work and everything that I didn't have time for church." A more truthful statement is that one does not make time. Jesus warned: "And the cares of this world, the deceitfulness of riches, and the desires for other things entering in choke the word, and it becomes unfruitful" (Mark 4:19).

"Lord, I am sorry for the way that I lived. If I had a chance to do it again, I would do better." No one gets a second chance. "It is appointed for men to die once, but after this the judgment" (Hebrews 9:27). Our life on earth is a one-shot deal (Titus 2:12).

Let us all be certain that we are prepared for that day, so we won't need any excuses.
